I was admitted by SGSS as a Form 1 student in 1961. My parents were very worried as SGSS did not exist and was not yet constructed then. My father was with me on the orientation day held at the Queen's College. We felt a little relieved after our first School Principal, Dr. Pong Tak Sun gave us a brief introduction of the school. We were housed under the roof of Clementi Secondary School for the first 3 years. We finally moved to our own school building when we were in Form 4. Then we had to share our school with Belilios Public School; and that made us all a big happy family.

My first Form 1D Mistress, Miss Esther Young appointed me as one of the class monitors on the first day we were in class. Since then I remained as the class monitor and a prefect throughout my years at our Mother School until I graduated in Form 5. I was elected as the first Head Prefect by the teachers when I was in my Form 4 and Form 5. I had the privilege of planting a tree in the school garden together with the teachers and the Head Boy on our first 'Plantation Day' in SGSS.

It usually takes an exemplary person to be a Head Prefect. The challenge in being a leader is that you have to be a model to your fellow schoolmates and set good examples. You are being judged by your behavior, performance and appearance.

Not necessarily that I possess all the aptitude to be the Head Prefect. I guess the reasons I was chosen to be one were I was very active in my school curricula activities and had achieved some good results. I was one of the top students in examination results during the earlier years in my secondary schooling; the highest ranking being no. 2 in the final examination in all six classes. Twice I represented the school participating in the inter-schools "English Public Speaking" contests in Hong Kong and had awarded first and second prizes in two consecutive years. The results were pleasantly surprising as none would expect that SGSS, a school name that was so new and un-familiar, could win over other strong competitors from the renowned schools, such as KGV, DGS, Belilios Public School etc. The Radio Hong Kong had broadcast my 1st prize speech. I had participated in various contests held by the School Musical Festivals and always achieved either first or

> second awards without fail. My photos, my name and the school name were in the newspaper on the education pages numerous times. I was active in sports as a member of the school badminton team and was in the semi-final list in the inter-school badminton competition. I was also a member of the school choir. All these made me somewhat "popular" in my school days.

> Then of course there were sacrifices. Due of the numerous involvements in the extra curricula activities, I was taken away from
